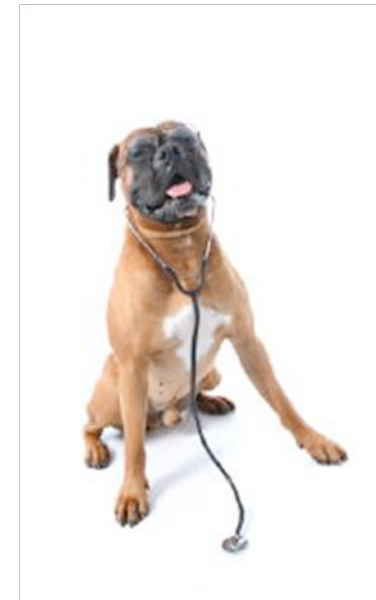

What Will a CPDT-KA Do For Me?

As a trusted partner in the care of their dog, owners often look to veterinarians for referrals to dog training and behavior professionals.

With no licensing or mandatory educational requirements for dog trainers, it can be difficult to determine which trainer has the experience and knowledge to best help your clients with training and behavior concerns.

Certified Professional Dog Trainers-Knowledge Assessed are required to provide recommendations by a veterinarian, a client, and a colleague. In addition, they must pass an independent, psychometrically sound and science-based exam to demonstrate knowledge in Instruction Skills, Animal Husbandry, Ethology, Learning Theory, and Equipment.

The CPDT-KA exam is updated annually to reflect changes in the industry and the current scientific data. CPDT-KAs must re-certify every three years by accumulating continuing education units approved by the CCPDT. In addition, a practical examination that tests a trainer's physical skill in dog training is currently in development.

The Certification Council for Professional Dog Trainers (CCPDT) serves to establish and maintain recognized standards of competence in dog training by certifying trainers through criteria based on experience, standardized testing, continuing education, and identifies those individuals to the dog owning public.
